


EDITORIAL

Five years ago, in March 1937, the first Concentrates was published. In this, its fifth year of publication, we would again repeat the words of our first editor, L.S. Hill, in his first editorial. "It is our desire therefore, to inaugurate a method by which the grads can keep in contact with the Ore Cangue, and with one another. It is hoped that all the grads will co-operate by keeping in close touch with the Geology Department."

In each of the ten succeeding editions this policy of the Concentrates was maintained, and with this the twelfth edition, we are printing a complete list of all our grads, their addresses and their occupations, based upon the latest news received concerning each one. In many cases this "latest news" is one or two years old. Any errors are beyond our control and are due only to the lack of information sent in by the grads in question. If every grad were to follow the policy of the first editorial, then this issue would be free of errors. Therefore, we ask you grads to read over carefully this complete list and to notify the editor of any changes. We promise you it will be remedied for the spring issue.

This editor must now make a confession. The finances of the Concentrates were indeed low this fall and you grads were in for a real soliciting campaign. However, several letters have come in from a few grads and we find ourselves in a much better position. There are still some facts which must be made known to you. The undergrad enrollment in the Gangue is decreasing and will continue to do so for the duration of the war. Each undergrad pays fifty cents to the Concentrates and the remaining expenses fall on the contributions from the grads. With the larger editions and wider circulation the cost of publishing is constantly rising. Yet if each grad were to contribute the same amount as the undergrad, the finances would no longer be a worry. After this edition is paid for there will be no more money in the Concentrates fund with which we can pay for the spring issue. We are therefor inaugurating a new system of accounts.

This fall we began, in the ledger book, a Concentrates Account. This account is to be kept running from year to year and it consists of a complete list of all the contributors and the amount contributed both in the past and in the future. If in the spring we find it our painful duty to curtail our circulation through lack of funds, those from whom we have never heard may be the first ones to be left off our mailing list. We know it is not an intentional oversight on your part, and with this reminder we are hopefully awaiting the onrush of mail that we are sure will be coming into the lab.

In a last few closing words, we wish to thank the faithful members who so regularly write to us and give us all the information they can. Keep it up fellows! We like to hear from you.

THE FALL BANQUET R. E. URTON

The activities of the Ore Gangue were officially begun on Halloween nite, Oct. 31, this year. Once again, the King George Hotel was graced by the presence of this cultured Society.

As usual, most of the members, including the three professors, arrived too early to start right in eating, and were forced to wait in the room just south of the Winston Room, and separated from the latter by a set of swinging doors. After a spell in this "waiting-room", every ganguester was in fine "spirits" (especially Coons), and equipped with a keen appitite for the excellent fare to follow.

Prof. Edmund's performance, as always, proved to be the highlight of the evening's entertainment.

Dr. Mawdsley then rose and gave an interesting talk about the Ore-Gangue. He told us how the gangue first started, with an understanding that the students themselves be responsible for the business end and activities of the society, and for its successes and failures. So far, Dr. Mawdsley said, the students could feel justly proud for the successful manner in which the Gangue's many activities have been conducted.
